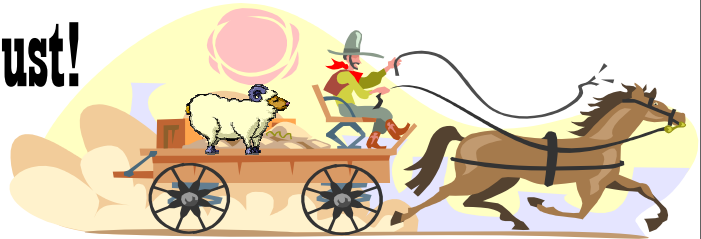

Wool entry is \$4 per fleece, with a two fleece limit per class. Champion and Reserve Champion fleeces will receive plaques and cash awards of \$25 and \$15. Class winners will receive placing ribbons. Fleeces will be judged Thursday afternoon, July 17th, following the Junior Show. There is no need to tie your fleeces. Prepare the fleeces as normal, roll and place in a clear plastic bag. Bags will be furnished if necessary. The SDSU Wool Team will offer to purchase fleeces following the show. If you would like to send a fleece to exhibit, it can be shipped to Darrell Deneke, 919 6th Ave., Apt 2., Brookings, South Dakota 57006.

Photo Contest

The Photo Contest must involve Targhee sheep. There is no entry fee or limit on number of photos submitted. This contest is open to anyone whose immediate family has a USTSA membership. Entries must be accompanied by an uncut negative or a CD with image files. Each photo should be mounted on stiff backing. Name, address, and phone number should be on the back side of the entry. **Entries may be submitted electronically to the Secretary at roeder@3rivers.net no later than Sunday, July 6th. There is a limit of two electronic entries per voting membership.** Electronic entries will be printed on photo paper and posted with regularly submitted photos.

All entries become the property of the USTSA and will ***NOT*** be returned. This year photos will be judged by popular vote of viewers. Ballots and a ballot box will be placed near the Targhee display area. The voting period will be from 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, July 17th through 5:00 p.m. Friday, July 18th. Winners will be announced at the banquet. Cash prizes will be awarded as follows: \$20 – 1st place; \$10 – 2nd place; and \$5 – 3rd place.

McCrorry Gardens

McCrorry Gardens, a campus and community focal point is managed by the SDSU Department of Horticulture, Forestry, Landscape and Parks. The garden serves as an outdoor teaching and research lab for undergraduate and graduate students at SDSU.

SDSU Coughlin Companile (SDSU Campus)

Since its construction in 1929, the Coughlin Companile has been the predominant symbol of South Dakota State University and one of the most outstanding man-made landmarks in the state. Funds for the 165-foot chimes tower were donated by Charles L. Coughlin, a 1909 electrical engineering graduate. Following a campaign to raise \$560,000 which was given by 3,500 alumni and friends, the Campanile was re-dedicated on September 22, 2001.

SDSU Dairy Bar

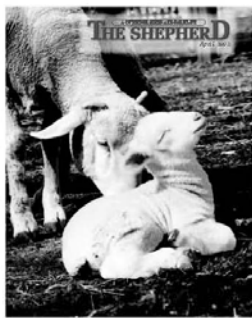

President's Notes - Bob Padula

May 2008

While the calendar indicates it is May, it sure doesn't seem like it this year. We have had a cold, snowy spring in Western Minnesota and pasture turn-out is delayed. With all the prediction of global warming, I'm bracing myself for two full days of summer this year.

I've come to the conclusion that something needs to change around here and that my sheep just aren't smart enough – they need to go to College. I went to college and was taught how to raise sheep by some of the best sheep researchers in the USA. So you can imagine my frustration when things don't go the way the book says they should.

I must have 6 or 8 of those lambing calendar tables and even one of those fancy sheep management wheels. You know the ones I'm talking about – where you check the date you put the ram in and it predicts what day the ewe will lamb. Being the educated one, I know how important it is to have several of these lambing guides, because different tables give you slightly different lambing dates. This way you can choose which table to use after lambing --- to give you the best predictions.

Unfortunately, the ewes forgot to read the calendar or to remember 2008 is a leap year; several of them lambed early. One ram lamb needs to learn how to read too, because he did his leaping last fall. I know who he is and thought I gave him enough "special tutoring" each time I put him back into the ram pen. Now I realize I should have written down those dates – to make sure the tables are accurate.

Another concern of mine is feeding and nutrition. The new NRC Nutrient Requirements of Small Ruminants book is very thorough and complete. In great detail, this book displays what the sheep needs for nutrients and when. My sheep don't eat properly according to this book. When given the opportunity, they will always eat more than the book indicates they need on a daily basis. I understand why some of them were not in shape coming into lambing. Not surprisingly, the same ewes that could not read the calendar can not solve algebraic equations and adjust their diet to ensure they were getting the correct grams of undegraded intake protein.

I'll bet some of these sheep don't read the Targeted Grazing handbook. How are they going to know what weeds to eat this summer or calculate the number of animal unit grazing days per cell in my rotational grazing program? Next thing I know they will be sneaking through the electric fence to the "greener" side - totally ignoring the voltage meter readings.

But all is not lost. I keep hearing that our Targhee Association web-page will soon have the National Sheep Improvement Program data (NSIP) and additional supporting material. With the Expected Progeny Differences (EPDs), the sheep will know how much they are expected to gain in relationship to their peers.

While in Brookings South Dakota this summer for the National Show and Sale, I'm going to find out the out-of-state tuition expenses for my sheep to attend SDSU. I may need to contact my Congressman about an earmark for a "No Sheep Left Behind" grant program.

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Meet Your USTSA Director

Dean Von Krosigk

Riverton, Wyoming

Where were you born and raised? I was born and raised in Riverton, Wyoming. I grew up on the farm we own and operate.

When did you become acquainted with Targhee sheep? How long have you raised them?

Producers can apply the product themselves. Just bring a note with your signature stating the treatment date, product, and dilution rate. Veterinary application is NOT required.
